HOMEWORK

This year your child is expected to complete one piece of English homework and one piece of Maths homework that will be set in their homework books. There will sometimes be topic homework set in place of this, but usually it will be in the homework books.

Year 3 will also need to practise their times tables on TT Rocks. Please focus on the x3, x4 and x8 times tables.

Children have the opportunity to complete their homework, in school, at 8:45 if they need to.

DRINKS AND SNACKS

Year 3 children can bring in a fruit snack for morning break time, the school does not provide a fruit snack for children in Keystage 2. Please ensure tubs and pots are named.

Milk is available each day and may be purchased termly. Drinking water is available in all the classrooms throughout the day. Children in Year 3 should provide a plastic mug or school drinking bottle clearly marked with their name.

<u>English</u>

Spoken Language

Year 3 children will be taught to:

- Listen and respond
- Ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge
- Use relevant strategies to build their vocabulary
- Articulate and justify answers, arguments and opinions
- Give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narrative for different purposes, including for expressing feelings
- Maintain attention and participate actively in collaborative conversations, staying on topic and initiating and responding to comments
- Use spoken language to develop understanding through speculating, hypothesising, imagining and exploring ideas
- Speak audibly and fluently

The children will have opportunities to work in groups of different sizes and as a whole class to help them to develop their competence in spoken language and listening to others.

Spelling

In years 3 and 4 there is an emphasis on learning root words (e.g. build, continue) and then using them to create longer words by adding suffixes or prefixes (e.g. builder, building, discontinue). Below are the suffixes, prefixes, new spellings and words from the new National Curriculum for English that should be known by children by the end of Year 3 and 4. Reading

Children are taught to read silently, with sustained concentration. They have the opportunity to read a range of books both Fiction and Non-Fiction. We teach comprehension as an ongoing skill and want all the children to be able to extract information from what they have read. It is always good practice to ensure children have fully understood what they have just read and questioning about a page is vital. For less confident readers letter sounds and sounding out a word should be practiced. Look closely at pictures, this may help us understand what has been written. For more confident readers ask how characters may feel, what could happen next and do they know what the word means that they have just read? Please ensure daily reading at home is maintained and above all make reading enjoyable.

<u>Writing</u>

Year 3 will learn how to plan for writing and organise ideas. They will learn how to make writing exciting and engaging and how to 'hook' the reader. They will learn how to expand sentences and make it more complex by using connectives, punctuation and paragraphs. They will also write for different purposes. This may be a letter or E-mail, a non-fiction page, instructions, newspaper article or poem. The children will also be encouraged to use what they have read as inspiration for their own writing.

<u>Handwriting</u>



In Year 3 the children will continue to improve their joined handwriting style. Please encourage your child to sit comfortably and to tilt their book/sheet when writing as this will help their writing to flow. Please complete any home writing challenges in pencil.

Mathematics

Number and place value

Children will be taught to count in multiples of 4, 8, 50 and 100. They will recognise place value of each digit in a three digit number. Read and write numbers to 1000 and apply their skills to solve practical number problems.

Addition and subtraction

Year 3 will learn how to add and subtract numbers with up to 3 digits using column addition and subtraction methods. They will estimate and use inverse operations to check answers to a calculation. Children will also be taught to solve missing number problems using number facts.

Multiplication and Division

Year 3 children will be taught to recall multiplication and division facts for 3, 4 and 8 times table. They will also use place value, known and derived facts to multiple and divide using written and mental methods.

Fractions

Children will learn to recognise that tenths arise by dividing an object into 10 equal parts and how to show a fraction of a shape and how to order basic fractions. They will also identify a fraction of a shape and progress to finding a fraction of a number.

Measurement

Year 3 children will be taught to measure, compare, add and subtract lengths and mass, volume and capacity. Measure perimeter of 2D shapes. Tell the time in 12 and 24hour forms and use all the associated time vocabulary.

Money

In Year 3 children will learn how to add and subtract money to pounds and pence and should be able to use column addition and subtraction, or number lines as a written method of working out.
